PROPOSAL TO OFFER A MINOR

Proposed Name of Minor: <u>Global Studies</u> 1. Catalog Description: (please follow accepted catalog format)

Minor in Global Studies (18 units; with pre- and co-requisites 19--37 units)

This interdisciplinary minor will provide students in any major the opportunity to develop their knowledge of the world and the major contemporary issues confronting humanity. Students in this minor will receive a foundation in global studies and an introduction into the various implications of globalization. By choosing electives across discipline areas, students will gain an interdisciplinary perspective into various global issues.

2. Justification for Proposed Minor (< 100 words):

The Global Studies minor embraces two of the pillars of the CSUCI mission in its interdisciplinary focus and its commitment to graduating students with international perspectives. Students in any major preparing for any profession can benefit from the Global Studies Minor. The ability to understand critical world issues from various viewpoints is fundamental for functioning as an informed citizen in today's world. Those interested in knowing more about the world and in understanding their reality within the global context, will benefit from this minor. Students completing the minor will be aware of the social, cultural, economic, and political dimensions of globalization. The minor will enable students to gain a better understanding of global issues such as global warming, inequality, poverty, migration, and governance, conflict, and security. In addition, students will be able to make interdisciplinary connections by selecting electives from at least two discipline areas. The foreign language requirement and an international study experience will further enforce a global perspective.

3. Total Number of Units in the Minor (including pre-/ co-requisites):¹

19--37 units

1. Language Requirement. Students need to successfully complete a second/foreign language requirement (e.g., the equivalent of the first four semesters or two years [intermediate level] in a language other than English), or demonstrate equivalent proficiency as approved by the CSUCI languages faculty. Some students with sufficient language proficiency would take <u>no</u> language coursework and would demonstrate proficiency by examination; others may need to take up to 16 units of language to satisfy this requirement. (NOTE: One semester of second/foreign language is a CSUCI graduation requirement for all students. Those with 3 years of high school Spanish, for example, can take SPAN 201 and 202: Intermediate Spanish I (4) and II (4), respectively, for a total of 8 units, and by so doing fulfill General Education C3a, C3b, and the CSUCI graduation requirement.) In the near future CSUCI will offer additional second/foreign languages. Justification: Proficiency in a second language is important for success internationally and is a component of international competence. While English is widely spoken around the world, being a monolingual English speaker can be a serious limitation. Gaining intermediate level proficiency in at least one other language is highly beneficial in learning how other cultures think and what they believe.

2. <u>Study Abroad Requirement</u>. Students must successfully complete a minimum of one international study abroad experience (e.g., UNIV 392 [1--3 units], a CSU International Program, or a study abroad program approved by a CSUCI faculty advisor).

Justification: Direct experience in another country and culture provides students with a unique international experience.
